MISS DOLLY DRESSUP a modern doll

TEDDY BEAR a stuffed bear

#### CHRISTMAS TEA

- AT RISE: The curtain opens to reveal three toys sitting in the corner of a child's playroom. About the room are large cardboard boxes painted as children's alphabet blocks. A TEDDY BEAR sits alone at STAGE LEFT with his arms open wide, in teddy bear fashion. Seated at a table are two DOLLS. There is a tea service on the table, with cups and saucers. STAGE RIGHT of the table is seated MISS DOLLY DRESSUP. She is a modern doll, very beautiful. She wears the latest afternoon tea dress, gloves and a smart hat. At table LEFT is seated MISS OLD-FASHIONED ALICE, a doll with a china face which is highly rouged and vividly painted. She wears an Alice-blue gown of our great-grand-mother's day, with many ruffles and a high lace collar. After a moment the THREE TOYS yawn and come to life. The TEDDY BEAR scratches his ribs, enjoying the luxury.
- DOLLY: A cup of Christmas tea before Santa arrives tonight, Miss Old-Fashioned Alice?
- ALICE: Yes, thank you, Miss Dolly Dressup. I do hope Santa arrives soon. I'm anxious to see him.
- DOLLY: (As she pours the tea.) Do you have a complaint about our little girl? If you do, Santa might not leave any toys for her tonight.
- ALICE: I have no complaint about her . . . (Points to TEDDY BEAR.)

  But I do have a complaint about HIM!
- DOLLY: Have you changed your mind, Mr. Teddy? Will you join us this time for tea? It's Christmas Eve!
- TEDDY: Grrr . . . ! (Each time TEDDY growls the DOLLS jump as if scared out of their wits.)
- ALICE: Really, Mr. Teddy. I wish you would stop that awful noise!
- DOLLY: (Politely.) Sugar, Miss Old-Fashioned Alice?
- ALICE: (Courteously.) One lump, Miss Dolly Dressup. (The DOLLS sip their tea.)
- DOLLY: We'll have to forgive Mr. Teddy. He's practicing his growling.

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ALICE: I don't know why. He's not a real bear.

TEDDY: (Loudly.) And you're not drinking real tea, either! (He lunges at them.) Grrr . . . ! (Again the DOLLS jump, startled. They regain their composure.)

DOLLY: (Politely.) Cream?

ALICE: No, dear. It's fattening.

TEDDY: (Approaching nearer to them.) Oh, why don't you dolls stop pretending?

ALICE: (Indignantly.) Pretending!

TEDDY: You dolls are always playing make-believe.

DOLLY: What else is there?

TEDDY: Be yourself, like me. (He walks about in front of them, rolling his shoulders, bear-like, and growling softly. The two DOLLS watch him suspiciously as they sip their tea. He crosses in front of them to STAGE RIGHT.)

DOLLY: Well, what can you expect, Miss Old-Fashioned Alice? He's only a teddy bear.

TEDDY: (Suddenly turns, jumps at DOLLY, growling.) Grrr . . . !

(Both DOLLS are startled again, particularly DOLLY.)

DOLLY: Oh!

TEDDY: (Laughing.) Ha ha ha! Well, I may be only a teddy bear, but I can sure make you jump, Dolly! Ha ha ha!

DOLLY: You scared me!

TEDDY: I'm glad I can scare somebody.

DOLLY: You've been looking at too many of those circus bears in our little girl's picture books.

ALICE: (Emphatically.) Mr. Teddy!

TEDDY: Oh, Alice, why don't you call me just plain Teddy? Or even Ted would do.

- ALICE: (She rises, again very emphatic.) Mr. Teddy, since you arrived last Christmas Eve, you have spoiled every one of our tea parties!
- TEDDY: Oh, I'm just trying to be myself. Do you want me to act like you do? Like a doll or something? (He imitates the DOLLS with mincing gestures and a high voice.) A cup of tea, dear? Yes, dear. Thank you, dear! (DOLLY giggles.) And the stuff's not even real!
- ALICE: (Crossing to him.) I realize you would like us to call each other by our first names. I don't. Remember, I was in this playroom first! I belonged to the great-grandmother of this household when she was a little girl, and I insist that we address each other like the dolls did in my day.

TEDDY: And just how was that?

ALICE: By our full, Santa Claus given names.

TEDDY: I think it's silly! There's only three of us. Let's not pretend with each other but be real friends. (He suddenly offers his paw to DOLLY.) Have a paw, pal!

DOLLY: (Jumps up and takes his paw in her hands, laughing.) Oh, Teddy, you're a ray of sunshine in this old playroom.

ALICE: Humph!

DOLLY: But I never know if you're going to hug me or chase me!

TEDDY: How about a teddy bear hug or a whisker rub? (DOLLY giggles, flattered and pleased. ALICE clears her throat reprimandingly. DOLLY sits down in her chair.)

ALICE: Mr. Teddy, you probably consider me old-fashioned. It's true I do not possess the modern . . . what I call (A slur at DOLLY) FADS of some of the dolls I've seen come and go here.

DOLLY: (Jumping up.) FADS? I'll have you know, Miss Old-Fashioned Alice, that all of my accessories are the latest thing. I have hair that can be put up in any style. I also come with seven dress-up outfits.

ALICE: Mercy!

TEDDY: Dolly, you're a wonder!

DOLLY: (She giggles and sits.) Thank you.

- ALICE: Well, I want you both to know that I have none of these fancy accessories. I don't have to, for I . . . (She feels her face lightly, lovingly.) . . . have a face made of real china glass!
- TEDDY: Is that why you sit all day propped up on pillows in the front room and can never come out and play?
- ALICE: Yes. I am very special. I am an antique. (TEDDY gives a low whistle.) I have worn out two cloth bodies and three Alice-blue gowns. (She feels her face delicately.) But my face is as pretty today as it was fifty years ago.
- DOLLY: Seventy, dear. You forgot the twenty you spent in the trunk.
- ALICE: Those extra twenty years in the attic I consider my years of rest.

DOLLY: (Coldly.) I see. More tea?

ALICE: (Acidly.) No thank you, dear. Not for me.

TEDDY: Grrr . . . ! (The DOLLS jump again, startled.) Oh, tea, tea, schmee! What you both need is a good chasing! Grr . . .! Grr . . .! (He chases the DOLLS about the room. The DOLLS ad lib "Oh!" "Oh!" "Oh, dear!" etc. After the chase ends, he holds his sides and rocks back and forth with laughter.) Ha ha ha! (The DOLLS, winded, collapse in their chairs.)

DOLLY: You see, Miss Old-Fashioned Alice, you never know if that Teddy Bear is going to hug you or chase you!


ALICE: (Confidentially.) I know, my dear. That's why I think he was delivered here last Christmas by mistake.
